

# The Toulmin Approach

## What is it?

The Toulmin Approach is a writing frame used to present an argument.

## Why are we using it?

We are using it because it helps to structure and organise our ideas.

# Toulmin

Begin your argument with a **simple sentence**, stating your point →  
*The death penalty is immoral.*

You are then going to **clarify** your point, making your argument stronger  
→  
*To clarify, it is a terrible and inhumane manner for a person to die.*

You then state **FOUR reasons that support your argument** →  
*There are many reasons to support and validate my argument:*

*the death penalty is murder; it denies a person of their basic human rights; there is always the possibility of the guilty verdict being wrong and it is not a suitable punishment.*

...notice how you are using the colon and the semi-colon here. This writing structure gives you the opportunity to use a **variation of punctuation!**

# Let's put it all together into our first paragraph...

The death penalty is wrong. To clarify, it is a terrible and inhumane way for a person to die. There are many reasons to support my argument: the death penalty is murder; it denies a person of their basic human rights; there is always the possibility of the guilty verdict being wrong and it is not a suitable punishment.

*Ok, so now what? We have our first paragraph, but what about the rest of our argument? The next four paragraphs will each address your reasoning for the argument...*

Paragraph 2: the death penalty is murder

Paragraph 3: it denies a person of their basic human rights

Paragraph 4: there is always the possibility of the guilty verdict being wrong

Paragraph 5: it is not a suitable punishment.
